



For comprehension, knowledge matters more than reading ability.

When tested with a text about baseball, "weak" readers in junior high school who knew a lot about baseball easily outperformed "strong" readers who knew little about the game. In other words, knowing a lot about the subject made the weak readers strong readers.





What Parents Can Do:

- Pull together sets of fiction and nonfiction books on specific topics to read aloud with
- Engage young children in discussions of everyday activities and discuss current events with older children.
- Visit museums, libraries, and local parks to make learning a frequent family activity.
- · Ask teachers for more knowledge-building assignments.
